

# THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: JANUARY 21, 2018 CELEBRATING THE YEAR OF MINISTRY

**Pastoral Reflections** Rev. Wilson Andrade, CSC Psalm 25 is a beautiful prayer of invitation to the people to trust in God's plan and providence. The proclamation of Jonah in city of Nineveh and the letter of St. Paul speaks of the urgency of changing of lifestyles and indifference so we can become faithful followers of Jesus Christ.

Mark in the Gospel reflecting on this powerful prophesy and the life and works of John, records and announces that Jesus is the fulfillment of that prophesy saying: *"The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the Gospel"* (Mk. 1: 15). To spread the Good News of the Kingdom in the Light of the Gospel, Jesus calls the first disciples to be part of this divine mission. The response of the disciples was that *'they left their nets and family and followed Jesus.'* (Mk. 1:18)

Today the Church by its sons and daughter continue to proclaim the Gospel of Christ. We ask ourselves: how are we proclaiming the Good news of the Kingdom of God? In order to follow Jesus and to live as the children of light we may have to leave behind – our selfishness, our anger, our pride – and discerning God's will with the prayer (Ps. 25): "Teach me your ways, O Lord, and guide in your truth!"

One night I had a dream. I dreamed I was walking along the beach with the Lord. Across the sky flashed scenes from my life. For each scene, I noticed two sets of footprints in the sand, one belonging to me, and the other to the Lord.
