#### **Happy Spring Message from Pope Francis**

Happy Spring! But what happens in Spring? Plants blossom, trees flower. I will ask you some questions. Can a sick tree or plant fully blossom if it is sick? No! Can a tree, a plant which is not watered by rain or artificially, blossom nicely? No. And can a tree and a plant whose roots have been removed or which have no roots flower? No. Without roots, can they flower? No! And this is a message: Christian life has to be a life that must blossom in works of charity, in doing what is good. But if you have no roots, you cannot blossom, and who is the root? Jesus! If you are not with Jesus, there in the roots, you will not blossom. If you do not water your life with prayer and the sacraments, will you bear Christian flowers? No! Because prayer and the sacraments water the roots and our life blossoms. I hope that your Spring may be bloom beautifully, as blooming as Easter will be; blossoming with good works, virtue and doing good to others. The Eucharist makes us strong in order to produce fruit in good works to live as Christians. Let us approach the Eucharist: receiving Jesus who transforms us into him makes us stronger.

#### The Road to Emmaus

Pastoral Reflections by Rev. Wilson Andrade, CSC

The story of disciples on the Road to Emmaus is a dramatic story of how the Eucharistic celebration becomes a place to experience the presence of the Risen Christ. We wonder why we should come to Sunday Mass! Today's liturgy answers that: "to recognize Jesus in the breaking of the bread."

It is true that we can experience the presence of God everywhere; creation, home, workplace, travelling, walking etc... But for us as believers, we meet Jesus *in the breaking of the bread* – during Eucharistic celebration.

In fact the story of those two disciples is our daily story of going for Mass. Like the disciples we come to the church with our own disappointments, misunderstanding, our daily struggles.

During the liturgy we listen to the Word of God – if we are truly open –it gives an insight into our life-struggles – we look

our whole life-story – in light of God. God speaking to us in the depth of our hearts.

In the second part of the liturgy we offer gifts – like the disciples welcomed Jesus into their home, wanted him to have supper with them. It is in the breaking of the bread that they recognized Jesus. If we see through the eyes of faith, we can recognize Jesus being present in the Eucharist.

The concluding part of the story is the most significant – they run back to Jerusalem to tell others about how they have seen Jesus. So we too are called to "Go" and spread the Good News: Jesus is Risen indeed! Alleluia!! Alleluia!!!

#### Feast Day of St. Kateri Tekakwitha

Kateri was born in the Mohawk village of Ossernenon near the town of Auriesville, New York, in the year 1656. Kateri converted to Christianity in her teens and was baptized as a Roman Catholic at the age of twenty, incurring the great hostility of her tribe. Although she had to suffer greatly for her Faith, she remained firm in it. Kateri went



to the Jesuit mission of Kahnawake, a new Christian colony of Natives in Canada, where she lived a life dedicated to prayer, penitential practices, and care for the sick and aged. She died on April 17, 1680 at the age of 24. St. Kateri Tekakwitha was canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on Oct. 21, 2012. She is the patroness of ecology and the environment, people in exile and Native Americans. Join us as we celebrate her feast day this Sunday, April 22.
