The readings for the 1st Sunday of Lent get us thinking about sin and temptation.

The first reading recounts the story of how Adam and Eve turned away from God. The psalm is a repentant appeal to the goodness of God. The second reading reminds us that even though we are sinners, we are saved through the obedience of Jesus Christ. And the gospel tells us how Jesus went to the desert to fast and pray for 40 days and resisted the temptations of Satan.

Lent: A Season of Grace

Dear Parishioners, we have begun the season of Lent, marking ourselves with the symbol of ashes on our forehead. Even though the season of lent might seem to be a time of mortification, when properly understood, it stands as a time of grace and a holy season. The mother church offers us a time, set apart to reflect on the special, sacrificial love that God has for us.

So, it is also a Time for a Change of Heart. Lent gives us time to consider our response to the Gospel's call to love God and neighbour: the New Law of Christ, written on our hearts by the Spirit at Baptism. Our Lenten prayer is thus one of repentance for sin, which fails to meet the demands of charity. It asks for a change of heart, that God might restore in us the heart of Christ, bestowed at Baptism.

It is also a Time for Renewing our Trust. The resurrection experience of Jesus tells us that in him, we can trust that the Father will raise us in the power of the Spirit from the small deaths we so often seem to undergo during Lent, so that we might joyfully celebrate the fullness of life that is our inheritance through Baptism, at Easter.

So, dear brothers and sisters, I invite you to take this time to feel and experience the love that God has for us. We could experience this in various ways. For instance, being gentle with each other, showing the love of God to others, and being mindful and intentional in our actions. Another important way is to participate in the liturgies of Lent, the stations of the cross, the Eucharist, fasting, and obstinance. I particularly invite you to participate in the tradition of walking the stations of the cross, a popular devotion through the centuries and to reflect on the love that Christ has for us. During the season of Lent. On Fridays during the season of Lent, we will have the stations of the cross at 6.30 p.m. and the Holy
